2018 Annual Report – Welcome Message LAYING THE FRAMEWORK

Dear Friends:

In January of 2018, NextGen Rochester's Advisory Committee outlined 2 key areas of focus for the upcoming year; organization and growth. We began our work focused on organizational governance (I'll spare you the riveting details, but we figured out what needs to be done, how it should be done and who gets yelled at if it isn't) which strengthened the organization and allowed us to achieve some significant accomplishments in the past year:

- With the help and guidance of the RACF, we streamlined and simplified our grantmaking (a process known as "rightsizing"), brought our application process entirely online, and increased our maximum grant award from \$2500 to \$3000. This reduces the time and effort required for our nonprofit partners to apply for grants while increasing our capacity for impact.
- Through a corporate partnership with the Steven James Media Group and freelance graphic designer Josh Ray, we underwent a "brand refresh", launched an updated logo and website and released a professionally produced promotional video.
- We opened up nominations for our "Young Philanthropist of the Year Award" beyond our direct membership in order to recognize and celebrate the generous philanthropic ideals of young professionals in the greater Rochester community.

This is an exciting time to be a part of NextGen, and we're hopeful that the work we've accomplished this year has laid the framework for rapid and significant growth of our membership and increased impact to our nonprofit partners in 2019. We urge you to do all that you can to help us make a positive change through NextGen; volunteer to serve on a committee, make a contribution to our Endowment fund, or invite a friend or colleague to join today.



2018 GRANTS

St. Michael's Woodshop (Awarded Full Grant \$3,000)

Student Stipends: St. Michael's Woodshop provides the opportunity for at-risk city teens (14 to 18), to learn a trade and earn stipends based on attendance and cooperation. The program additionally focuses on teaching responsibility, allowing students to learn to cooperate, provides assistance with homework and personal problems, and assists students to graduate from high school.

The original program began in 1967 and collaborates with other local organizations, for example, "Students built bookcases for city school second graders and for Mayor Warren's "Story Time with Style" program; helped Cub Scouts with their soapbox derby models; built a dollhouse for the Monroe County Family Court Children's Center, etc."

NextGen's grant will allow five students to spend four months each in the program.

The South Wedge Food Program/Presbytery of the Genesee (Awarded Full Grant \$3,000)

Emergency Food Program: The South Wedge Food Program is unique in that recipients do not need to provide proof of income or referral paperwork. It is also not zip-code limited. Provided food includes vegetables, protein, milk, and staples such as pasta, cereal and applesauce. Personal hygiene items are available as are volunteers to assist clients with referrals to social services or to provide a listening ear. A focus is providing food with "dignity and respect".

On an average day, 20 people are served. The pantry is open three days a week for three hours. Food is purchased through a significantly discounted rate through FoodLink, and the program collaborates with other local organizations.

NextGen's grant will assist throughout the next year with the emergency food program.

Cracker Box Palace, Inc. (Awarded Partial Grant \$1,000)

STEADY Work Program: Cracker Box Palace serves as the large animal shelter for Wayne County. The STEADY Work program allows young adults (ages 18-24) to learn soft skills and work 15 hours per week over a six-month period. Partnerships with Literacy Volunteers and Wayne County Catholic Charities ensure a successful program that may involve obtaining a high school diploma, returning to school, or entering the workforce, while pairing participants with the right resources for success.

The STEADY work program was piloted in 2013 with one participant and now has thirty participants exit the program with twenty five employed in Wayne County. "Anyone is allowed to apply that wants to make a significant change in their lives and find a job."

PUSH Physical Theatre, Inc. (Awarded Partial Grant \$1,000)

PUSH Yourself: Toward Strength of Body, Mind and Character: PUSH Physical Theatre's mission is to "create and perform physical stories to inspire change and empower learners of all ages to tell their own stories." PUSH is developing a new physical theatre residency model, to include a total of ten contact sessions of 90-minutes each for a group of 20 teens." There will be skill-building and rehearsing sessions, a demonstration session, a reflection session; evaluation and review, along with a final report to be shared with the PUSH Board of Directors and Villa of Hope staff.

Teens in Monroe County receive trauma-informed care at the Villa of Hope to address behavioral, educations, and emotional needs. Twenty participants in this program (14-18), will learn to use theatre and movement skills to engage their body and mind as they "push" toward a healthy state. An additional twenty teens will be invited to a presentation session as the audience.

2018 YOUNG PHILANTHROPIST OF THE YEAR AWARD

Philanthropist of the Year Award was presented to FRANCIS J. CLEMENT at NextGen's Annual Community Showcase held at Geva Theatre Center on November 19, 2018. The annual award, now in its 4th year, is given in honor of the founding members of NextGen Rochester and is awarded to a Young Philanthropist in the Greater Rochester Region who best embodies the desire to promote the welfare of others through generous financial support along with exemplary service to local community nonprofit organization(s).

is a current board member of the
Rochester Area Community Foundation,
a member of the RACF's African
American Giving Initiative, a member of
the University of Rochester's George
Eastman Giving Circle, a supporter of
the Black Physician's Network, a

Ministries urban outreach community
center, a supporter of the Black

Women's Leadership Council at Xerox and an active member and benefactor of the Church of Love. In his involvement with these organizations, Francis "truly walks the walk, and is deserving of recognition for all that he has done at such a young age. He not only recognizes the need for a hand out, but understands it must come with a helping hand up – teaching and guiding people to not be victims of circumstances, but to grow and be stronger because of them. He not only gives of his financial resources, he takes a personal interest in people, and makes them feel welcome in the community", said Dr. Linda Clark, founder and board member of the Black Physician's Network of Greater Rochester.

A well-deserved congratulations to Mr. Clement; a truly remarkable young philanthropist whose generosity, dedicated involvement, and desire to improve the lives of others makes him an extraordinary example of NextGen's founding principles.


